## Taoiseach's Foreword

## Child poverty and well-being...




Over time, Ireland has made substantial progress in addressing child poverty and supporting well-being. Today income supports, public services and community infrastructure all play an important role in protecting children from poverty and promoting child well-being.

Addressing child poverty is important because of what we know about the long-term effects of even transient experiences of child poverty (ESRI 2021).

In common with other countries, children are more likely to experience poverty than adults.

Some groups of children consistently fair poorly, including those living in lone parent households, rented households, households out of work, low levels of maternal education, children of migrants, minority ethnic groups, Traveller children, children with a disability.


Fortunately, the child poverty rate had been decreasing since 2014, but 2022 (2021 data) saw an increase.





Existing policy....

The Programme Office has undertaken a policy-mapping exercise across six key areas. Initial scoping includes 50+ policies and strategies.



## Role of the Programme Office



Following an announcement in December 2022, the Child Poverty and Well-being Programme Office was established in the Department of the Taoiseach in Spring 2023 to coordinate and focus Government action on child poverty and well-being.

#### The role of the Office is to:

- Monitor the delivery of policy commitments by Departments and their Agencies across the six priority areas and focus on specific areas of action.
- 2. Undertake a small number of strategic initiatives which have the potential to increase the impact of current and emerging measures to end child poverty and improve child well-being.

The Office will work closely with DCEDIY to contribute to the work and structures of *Young Ireland* (the new National Framework on Children and Young People), including providing regular updates on progress to the Policy Forum, the National Advisory Council, and child participation structures. The Programme Office will be a *Spotlight* initiative under the new Framework.

In August 2023, the Office published its initial work programme for the next two and a half years, From Poverty to Potential: A Programme Plan for Child Poverty and Well-being 2023-2025

### First Programme Plan



✓ Identifies the progress which has been made and the challenges that remain, including the contextual and intergenerational experiences of poverty.

✓ Describes the ambition for change for each of the six priority areas, including specific focus issues for each area.

- ✓ Defines the specific purpose of the Programme Office.
- ✓ Describes the governance and monitoring mechanisms.
- ✓ Identifies a small number of cross-government actions which will be undertaken by the Programme Office.
- ✓ Sets out a specific, focused and time-bound programme of work over twoand-a-half years (July 2023 - December 2025).



### 6 Priority Areas



In April, Government decided on six priorities to reflect the dual and interconnected nature of the remit of the Programme Office mandate in that they focus both on child poverty and child well-being.



## A Focus on Child Poverty in the Annual Budget



The annual budget is a critical moment in which Government articulates its ambition for the coming year. Given the Government's commitment to reducing child poverty, the extent to which the budget reduces child poverty and strengthens children's well-being is an important area of work for all concerned.

In order to prepare a child poverty budget, Departments will be asked to outline their overall spending that will impact on child poverty, as well as their spending in relation to the six priority areas.

The budget may build on existing analyses, such as the distributional analyses currently published by the Department of Finance, performance and equality budgeting activities led by DPENDPR, and child expenditure mapping being conducted by DCEDIY with other Departments.



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
