


### Children's Rights Alliance Research

#### **RED Line Methodology**

- Research was conducted using RED C's online omnibus, the RED Line.
- Through an online panel of over 45,000 members, RED Line allows us to reach a representative sample of the adult population 18+ across Ireland in a cost effective and timely manner.
- Quota controls are used to ensure a nationally representative sample of ROI adults aged 18+, with interlocking quotas to provide extra confidence in sample profile.
- Data was weighted across gender, age, region and social class so as to ensure a nationally representative sample based on latest CSO projections.
- A nationally representative sample of n=1,006 adults aged 18+ was completed.
- Fieldwork took place from the 16<sup>th</sup> 21<sup>st</sup> August 2024



# The government hot school meals programme and free books scheme for primary school students are widely known and well received by most of the Irish population



There is also an appetite among the electorate to expand on the current programmes to encompass secondary school students, and low-income families outside of school terms. A strong majority are also of the sentiment that supports for those with pre-school aged children in disadvantaged areas should be afforded within Budget 2025.

Irish people largely welcoming of expansion of school meals programme

7 in 10 Irish adults are aware of hot school meals being provided to primary school children, rising to 84% amongst parents of children aged 3-12.

The programme shows high levels of popularity, with 89% of the population agreeing that children should have access to a hot-meal throughout the day.

Expansion would likely be popular with 85% believing that secondary aged school kids should have the same accessibility.

7 in 10 believe the programme should be extended to holidays for low-income families as a way of tackling 'holiday hunger'.

School book scheme for primary school shows similar levels of support

3 in 4 Irish adults are aware of the free books scheme for primary school children, though almost all (91%) parents of primary school children are familiar with the scheme.

The scheme is widely recognised as an effective way of alleviating pressure for backto-school costs for parents (94% agreement).

Almost 9 in 10 (88%) believe that this programme should be extended to secondary school students. Most in favour of supports for low-income families in upcoming budget

Over 4 in 5 Irish people believe that Budget 2025 should include additional investment in pre-school services for lowincome families.

A similar proportion (76%) of the population believe the government should increase social welfare supports for children in low-income families.


**School Meals** 



Most are aware of government initiative providing hot school meals

This is naturally stronger amongst parents, particular with those at children at primary school level.

Q1. Which of the following government initiatives, if any, were you aware of before today?



#### Strong support for extending the current government scheme



Most show similar levels of agreement that both primary and secondary pupils should be afforded a free meal. While showing some resistance, most feel these supports should continue out of term for kids from disadvantaged backgrounds.












